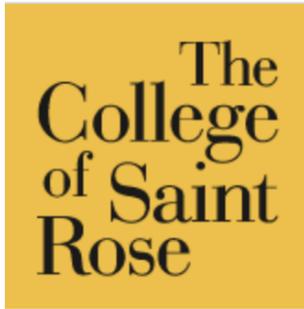

A (Brief) History of Generative AI in Computing Education: From Use Cases to Tools, Strategies, and Assessment

Generative artificial intelligence (AI) is fundamentally reshaping the landscape of computing education, necessitating a paradigm shift in teaching methodologies, curriculum, and assessment. This talk will provide a concise overview of the evolution of generative AI within the realm of computing education, tracing its journey from identifying initial capabilities—such as generating explanations and analogies, or identifying bugs—to grappling with the challenges posed by more recent multi-modal models in assessment. Drawing upon additional insights gleaned from interview studies with students and instructors, this presentation will offer a contextualized narrative of the transformative impact of generative AI. Finally, the talk will conclude with a vision for the future including emerging tools, promising strategies, and changing assessment

Machine Learning for Human Learning: Complex Data Challenges

Large volumes of data are collected from users of online platforms, including students of online learning systems every day. This volume of data provides the opportunity for machine learning and data mining models to discover how individuals learn and provide pathways for personalized learning. However, this data is also highly complex. Missing, noisy, and sparse observations, data heterogeneity, and evolving temporal patterns are a few of these complexities. This talk inspects current research problems at the intersection of machine learning and education. Examples of such problems are student knowledge tracing and procrastination modeling. In knowledge tracing, we answer questions like “how to quantify the gradual knowledge gain in students, given their noisy interactions with learning materials?” In procrastination detection, we are interested to learn “how to predict the time when the students will work on a specific assignment, even if they haven’t started working on it?” This talk also explores the solutions to deal with these challenges and examples of recent discoveries in them.

Invited Speakers

Stephen MacNeil is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Computer and Information Sciences at Temple University where he directs the Human-Computer Interaction Lab. His work in computing education spans inclusive classroom design, scalable undergraduate research ecosystems, and generative AI in education. His work has been published in top ACM venues including SIGCSE, ICER, ITiCSE, CHI, UIST, and CSCW. Committed to fostering undergraduate research, over 50 undergraduate students have published a paper or poster during their time in the lab.

Shaghayegh Sahebi Sherry Sahebi is an Associate Professor of Computer Science at the University at Albany – SUNY and the director of Personalized AI (PersAI) Lab. She received her Ph.D. and M.Sc. in Intelligent Systems Program from the University of Pittsburgh. Also, she has an M.Sc. and B.Sc. in Computer Science/Engineering from the University of Tehran and Sharif University of Technology, respectively. Her broad research interests include machine learning and data mining for human-centered applications, such as educational, recommendation, and health application systems. Her research has been supported by three NSF awards, including a CAREER award in 2021 and a CRII award in 2018. Her research has been featured in peer-reviewed publications in major venues such as The International Educational Data Mining (EDM), ACM Web conference, ACM Recommender Systems (RecSys), The AAAI Conference on Artificial Intelligence (AAAI), and Artificial Intelligence in Education (AIED). She has also been an active member of the research community, e.g., serving as the program co-chair of the Fourteenth International Conference on Educational Data Mining (EDM 2021).
